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KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



Lillian Comas-Diaz, Ph.D. is a Clinical Psychologist and a Clinical Professor in the George Washington University Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences. Previously, she was a faculty member of the Yale University Department of Psychiatry, where she also directed its Hispanic Clinic. Dr. Comas-Diaz has authored more than 100 publications, is the author of *Multicultural Care: A Clinician's Guide to Cultural Competence*, and the co-editor of 5 books. She is the founding editor of *Cultural Diversity and Ethnic Minority Psychology*, the official journal of the Society for the Psychological Study of Ethnic Minorities Issues (Division 45 of the American Psychological Association). In addition, Dr. Comas-Diaz serves on several editorial boards and is an associate editor of APA's journal, the *American Psychologist*.



Kurt C. Organista, Ph.D., is Professor, School of Social Welfare, University of California, Berkeley. He is interested in Latino health and mental health, conducts research in the area of HIV prevention with Latino migrant laborers, and is editor of *HIV Prevention with Latinos: Theory, research and practice* published in 2012 by Oxford University Press, and author of *Solving Latino psychosocial and health problems: Theory, practice, and populations* published in 2007 by John Wiley & Sons, Inc. Dr. Organista serves on the senior editorial board of the *American Journal of Community Psychology*, and on the editorial boards of the *Hispanic Journal of the Behavioral Sciences*, and the *Journal of Ethnic and Cultural Diversity in Social Work*.



Michael Fowlin, Psy.D. is an Actor, Clinical Psychologist, and Poet. He has assembled exciting programs on the issues of race, discrimination, violence prevention, and personal identity. Dr. Fowlin's original and powerful presentations, now seen by over a million people, bring a heightened awareness of these issues to students, faculty, administrators, and parents. 2012 NATIONAL LATINA/O PSYCHOLOGICAL ASSOCIATION AWARDS

NLPA, Cynthia de las Fuentes Dissertation Award

The purpose of this award is to support students in finishing their dissertation project. This award includes \$500 through a generous donation by Dra. Cynthia de las Fuentes who is a private practitioner in Austin Texas. Criteria for the award include: Focusing on issues related to Latino/a Psychology theory, research, or practice; and Contributing in a substantive way to the advancement of knowledge related to Latino/a Psychology.

NLPA, Outstanding Dissertation Award

This award recognizes exceptional dissertation research projects that are completed and have been defended between the more recent NLPA conference (in this case, November, 2010) and July 1, 2012. The dissertation topic must cover issues related to Latino/a psychology and make a unique contribution to the literature.

NLPA, Distinguished Student Service Award

This award is conferred upon a graduate student who has made outstanding service contributions to the US Latina/o community. This award includes \$500 through the generous donation of NLPA executive board members. Service contributions can include activities such as the development of creative educational programs or other novel activities in the advancement of service, working to increase funding for agencies, working on legislation regarding mental health, involvement in policy-related issues, and initiating outreach programs.

NLPA, Star Vega Distinguished Service Award

This award is conferred upon a psychologist who has distinguished him or herself through service to the Latino/a community). The award is named in honor and memory of Dr. Star Vega. Dr. Star Vega, Practitioner, Professor of Psychology, and advocate for all psychologists, died Saturday April 24, 2004 at the young age of 55 due to leukemia. Dr. Vega was core faculty in the doctoral program in Clinical Psychology at Phillips Graduate Institute. She was also the 2002 President of the California Psychological Association, the first Latina to occupy this position.

NLPA, Distinguished Professional Early Career Award

This award is conferred upon a psychologist whose contributions have advanced an agenda congruent with NLPA's mission. Early career is defined as 10 years or less since earning a doctoral degree.

NLPA, Distinguished Professional Career Award

This award is conferred upon a psychologist whose contributions have advanced an agenda congruent with NLPA's mission. Distinguished career is defined as 15 years or more since earning a doctoral degree.
