On behalf of the National Latinx Psychological Association, we would like to acknowledge that our conference is being held on the sacred ancestral lands of the Cheyenne, Ute. and Arapaho tribes. 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Maysa Akbar, PhD, ABPP

Keynote Speaker Chief Diversity Officer of the American Psychological Association

Dr. Maysa (MY-sa) Akbar is the Chief Diversity Officer and Interim Chief of Psychology in the Public Interest at the American Psychological Association. In these roles, she is charged with infusing equity, diversity, and inclusion (EDI) into the fabric of the association's work and applying the science and practice of psychology to foster the advancement of human rights, fairness, and dignity for all segments of society.

A respected scientist-practitioner, Dr. Akbar is the architect of the Urban Trauma[™] framework, which works to identify, reclaim, and heal from structural racism. Her areas of specialty include racial identity development, racism, urban trauma, and allyship. Dr. Akbar's areas of specialty include racial identity development, racism, urban trauma, and allyship. Between 2004-2021, she held a faculty appointment at the Yale School of Medicine Child Study Center as an assistant clinical professor. Akbar is the author of two acclaimed books, Beyond Ally: The Pursuit of Racial Justice (2020) and Urban Trauma: A Legacy of Racism (2017). She holds a PhD in clinical psychology from St. Louis University and is certified in child and adolescent psychology by the American Board of Professional Psychology (ABPP).



Cynthia de las Fuentes, PhD Keynote Speaker

President-Elect Candidate of the American Psychological Association

As the eldest of three daughters born into a Mexican American family, my father was a US Naval officer and war veteran and my mother an anesthetist. We traveled to, and lived in, many places and countries. To help you understand how traditional they were, I earned my undergraduate degree in two years mainly because my father taught that a "good girl" went from her father's house into her husband's – unless she earned an education so she could support herself, and I really wanted to move out from under his overprotective watch. (My two younger sisters are a chemist and cardiologist!) One of my undergraduate professors told me that to become a psychologist I had to learn how to do research, so I applied for the first research opportunity I found and moved my 20-year-old self to Guam to assist a school psychologist investigate meditation and visualization on vocabulary and math achievement in elementary school children.

Due to my parent's careers, I was raised in relative privilege, but they were raised in poverty. When we weren't living abroad, we visited our extended families in Texas and Mexico at least every summer and x-mas holiday. Most of my childhood they lived on dirt roads or didn't have indoor plumbing. The experiences I gained from traveling and living in different communities in my youth exposed me to the problems and pain of marginality and powerlessness that has been a part of life for the people in the communities I came from and learned to care about. I wanted to become a psychologist to help people heal from the traumas that result from the damage imposed on them by systems, institutions, cultures, and circumstances designed to subjugate their lives.





Rebecca Vargas-Jackson, MD Surgeon & Infectious Disease Specialist

Dr. Rebecca Vargas-Jackson, M.D., is a surgeon, and infectious disease specialist. She is also bilingual, English and Spanish. Dr. Vargas-Jackson has been working for over 25 years as a subject matter expert for a variety of agencies and organizations developing assessments, and providing training, technical assistance, capacity building, and, particularly but not exclusively on: cultural competency in health care, health related stigma, health literacy, culturally tailored communications, and messaging transcreation. Her principal focus has been underserved populations, racial/ethnic minorities, lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT), hard to reach, and new immigrant communities.

She is a co-organizer of the annual "International Stigma Conference at Howard University." Dr. Vargas-Jackson was one of the co-writers of the DHHS 'National Standards for Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate Services in Health Care (CLAS).' She has been affiliated with George Mason University (GMU) as research faculty, College of Health and Human Services. At GMU, she was the first Executive Director of the Area Health Education Center (NVAHEC). Additionally at Mason, she taught courses on Principles of Global Health, and Health and Disease to graduate and undergraduate students, and has been instrumental in facilitating partnerships between the University and community-based organizations, faith-based organizations, and Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) to develop alliances to apply for grants that target major health gaps and disparities affecting primarily new immigrant and/or disenfranchised communities throughout the United States.

Dr. Vargas-Jackson was also Senior Vice President for Research at the National Association of People with HIV/ AIDS (NAPWA). There she led projects whose goals were to increase awareness and knowledge of HIV prevention and treatment and develop community mobilization interventions geared toward increased participation in testing campaigns to facilitate access to health care, prevention, treatment, and follow-up services.

Additionally, she served as Executive Director of Health and International Programs at WRMA, Inc. (a small business that provides and implementation services to HRSA & amp; CDC); and Co-Principal Investigator and Director of Research at Whitman Walker Clinic in Washington, D.C.



Patricia Arredondo, EdD Founding President of NLPA President of Arredondo Advisory Group

Dr. Patricia Arredondo has dedicated her career to advancing social justice, cultural competency development, immigrant and Latinx mental health education, women's leadership, and organizational diversity strategy. Dr. Arredondo is president of the Arredondo Advisory Group, a consulting and executive coaching organization addressing DEIB strategy consultation in different workplace settings.



Leadership roles include president of the American Counseling Association, Association of Multicultural Counseling and Development, Society for the Psychological Study of Culture, Ethnicity, and Race, and founding president of the National Latinx Psychological Association.

She is co-author of the Multicultural Counseling Competencies and Multicultural Guidelines used to guide change in universities and other settings. She is the author of more than 100 publications and training videos. Her recently released co-authored book is Women and the Challenge of STEM Professions: Thriving in the Chilly Climate. Other best-selling texts are Successful Diversity Management Initiatives, Culturally Responsive Counseling with Latinas/ os and Latinx Immigrants: Transcending Acculturation and Xenophobia published in 2018.

Dr. Arredondo served as President of the Chicago School of Professional Psychology, Chicago campus and senior administrator and professor with Arizona State University and the University of Milwaukee-Wisconsin. She resides in Phoenix and Mexico City. On a personal note she comments: I learned how to walk the "borderlands" and to appreciate my bicultural and bilingual upbringing from my family. I am a Mujerista.



Melanie Domenech Rodriguez, PhD Past President of NLPA Full Professor, Utah State University

Melanie M. Domenech Rodríguez is a professor in the Psychology Department at Utah State University since 2000. Her research focuses on parenting and families, evidence- based treatments, Latinxs, and ethics, with branches that combine these at different intersections. Her teaching focuses on multicultural psychology and diversity issues in treatment and assessment.

Dr. Domenech Rodríguez is a proud mentor to diverse psychologists who have carried on and extended the work to achieve a more inclusive psychology whether in research, teaching, practice, and/or policy. Dr. Domenech Rodríguez is a lifetime member of the National Latinx Psychological Association as has served in many roles including president (2016), member of the Professional Practice Issues Committee that resulted publication in the development of the NLPA Ethical Guidelines (2013-present), and conference reviewer (2014-present). Dr. Domenech Rodríguez was a member of theplanning committee that prepared the proposal for the Journal of Latina/o Psychology (2009-2010) and is proud to have served as a reviewer for the journal as well as an author. NLPA is Dr. Domenech Rodríguez's primary professional home. She was honored in 2012 with the Star Vega Distinguished Service Award and in 2019 with the Jeanett Castellanos Mentorship Award.

Dr. Domenech Rodríguez was born and raised in Puerto Rico. She draws strength from being the daughter of a Cuban immigrant mother and a multi-generation Puerto Rican father. Her parents instilled in her a social justice orientation and awareness of racism and colonialism that has been a foundational current in herprofessional career and in her parenting of two brave and wonderful offspring.

Kim I. Mills is senior director of strategic communications and public affairs for the American Psychological Association, responsible for strategic messaging, media relations and content creation. She joined APA in 2007 as deputy executive director of what was then Public and Member Communications.

Mills led the association's foray into social media, establishing highly successful sites on Facebook, LinkedIn and Twitter, among others (with a collective following of more than 1.5 M). She envisioned and launched APA's award-winning podcast series "Speaking of Psychology." She took over as host in 2020. Episodes of the podcast have been downloaded more than 8 million times since 2018.

Mills also played a key role in the development of APA's award-winning public education campaign "Psychology: Science in Action." She has been a contributing editor and writer for APA's Monitor magazine.

Before joining APA, Mills spent two years as director of communications and public affairs at Whitman-Walker Clinic (now Whitman-Walker Health), then the largest HIV/AIDS service provider in the D.C. metro area. Earlier, Mills spent eight years with the Human Rights Campaign, acting as a key media spokesperson for the organization




and building HRC's highly successful workplace advocacy program and launching its ground-breaking Corporate Equality Index, which rates employers based on their policies that support LGBTQ employees and customers. She also oversaw HRC;'s award-winning website, its magazine (of which she was executive editor) and the National Coming Out Project, among other responsibilities. She was also assistant vice president of the Human Rights Campaign Foundation.

Mills has extensive media experience, including being interviewed by The New York Times, The Washington Post, the Wall Street Journal and other top-tier print media. She has appeared on CNN, "Good Morning America," "Hannity and Colmes," CSPAN and the BBC, to name a few of her broadcast engagements.

Earlier in her career, Mills spent 14 years as a reporter and editor for The Associated Press, based first in New York and later in Washington, where she rose to national reporter and weekend supervisor. She has also written for The Washington Post, Fast Company, the American Journalism Review, The Dallas Morning News, MSNBC.com and the Harvard Business Review, among other publications.

Mills holds a bachelor's degree in biology from Barnard College and a master's in journalism from New York.



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
